The Government of Peru (GOP) and the Government of the United States of America (USG) agree to participate in a cooperative project to suppress the production, distribution and use of illicit drugs and to take actions and to commit resources, herein described, which are designed to assist that endeavor.

The actions and resources which will be provided to the project by the Government of Peru and the Government of the United States of America are explained in the Narrative and in Sections A through E of the Project Outline and Working Paper, which form an integral part of this Project Agreement. These sections delineate: a) the goal of the project and the indicators which will be used to determine goal achievement; b) the time-phased objectives which are designed to guide the project to realization of the goal; c) the resources which will be committed to the project; d) the project implementation schedule; and e) the USG funding table. Funds obligated by the USG by this agreement are shown on page 1 of the Project Agreement. USG future year funding for this project is contingent upon US Congressional approval.

The parties to this agreement anticipate that modifications in the project design may be desirable during the life of the project. The list of objectives may change as original objectives are realized and new ones are added; other changes may be advisable in order to profit from experience or to pursue new opportunities. Such changes may be made by mutual agreement to amendments to the project document.

It is mutually agreed that personnel of the Government of Peru and the USG personnel assigned to support the project will coordinate and cooperate in drug abuse prevention activities. The GOP agrees to assign a counterpart officer from DINTEID/PIP to serve as Project Coordinator for the purpose of performing those functions mutually identified as necessary to ensure the successful implementation of the project. The Government of Peru (GOP) and the Government of the United States of America (USG) agree to support all of the terms of this Project Agreement from the date of signing until SEPTEMBER, 1989.

This project agreement is made pursuant to, and is subject to the terms of, the general agreement on technical cooperation between the Government of the United States of America (USG) and the Government of Peru (GOP) signed January 25, 1951.

STANDARD PROVISIONS

A. The USG shall not be required to make any of the contributions shown in Block 7 of the Prow/Ag face sheet not sub-obligated within six (6) months after the end of the fiscal year in which this Prow/Ag is signed. This date will be entered in Block 10 (Sub-obligation Terminal Date) and date shown will be automatically designated as six (6) months after the end of the fiscal year in which the Prow/Ag is signed. Any exception to this or extension of the final contribution date can only be authorized by the Assistant Secretary of the Department of State for International Narcotics Matters.

B. Title of all property procured through financing by the USG of this Project Agreement shall be in the Cooperating Agency, unless otherwise specified in the applicable procurement document.

- C. The procurement of commodities and contract services to be financed in whole or in part by the USG under this project agreement may be undertaken only pursuant to applicable Department of State procurement regulations.
- D. Any property furnished to either party through financing by the other party pursuant to this Project Agreement shall be devoted to the project until completion of the project, and thereafter shall be used as to further the objectives sought in the project. Either party shall offer to return to the other, or to reimburse the other for, any property which it obtains through financing by the other party pursuant to this Project Agreement which is not used in accordance with the preceding sentence. Funds derived from the sale of any property furnished by the USG to the project shall be used in the furtherance of narcotics control activities. The USG will have the right to examine, inspect and audit property for up to three (3) years after project is completed.
- E. If the United States Government or any public or private organization furnishing commodities through United States Government financing for operations under this Project Agreement is, under the laws, regulations or administrative procedures of the cooperating country, liable for customs duties and import taxes on commodities imported into the cooperating country for purposes of carrying out this Project Agreement, the Cooperating Agency will pay such duties and taxes unless exemption is otherwise provided by applicable international agreement.
- F. The Cooperating Agency shall make such arrangements as may be necessary so that funds introduced into the Cooperating Country by the USG for purposes of carrying out obligations of the USG under this Project Agreement shall be convertible into currency of the Cooperating Country at the highest rate which, at the time the conversion is made, is not unlawful in the Cooperating Country.
- G. The USG shall expend funds and carry on operations pursuant to this Project Agreement only in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations of the USG.

- H. The two parties shall have the right (1) to examine any property procured through financing by that party under this Project Agreement to determine that such property is being used in accordance with the terms of the project, and (2) to inspect and audit any records and accounts with respect to funds, properties, and contract services furnished by the party under this Project Agreement to determine that such funds, services or properties are being utilized properly in accordance with terms of the project.
- I. The two parties agree to establish an evaluation program which will include evaluation of project goals, design and progress at least once each year during the life of the project, and both parties agree to provide appropriate personnel to participate in the evaluation process.
- J. The Cooperating Country agrees to retain personnel who have received narcotics training in the United States in a drug abuse control assignment for a minimum of two years after completing such training, except as may be mutually agreed upon by the USG and cooperating country.
- K. If any personnel (other than citizens and residents of the Cooperating Country), whether United States Government employees, or employees of public or private organizations under contract with, or individuals under contract with, the USG, and Cooperating Agency or any agency authorized by the Cooperating Agency, who are present in the Cooperating Country to provide services which the USG has agreed to furnish or finance under this Project Agreement, are, under the laws, regulations or administrative procedures of the Cooperating Country, liable for income and social security taxes with respect to income upon which they are obligated to pay income or social security taxes to the Government of the United States of America, for property taxes on personal property intended for their own use, or for the payment of any tariff or duty upon personal or household goods (including automobiles) brought into the Cooperating Country for the personal use of themselves and members of their immediate families (not including such personal or household goods as are sold by any such personnel in

the Cooperating Country), the Cooperating Agency will pay such taxes, tariff, or duty unless exemption is otherwise provided by any applicable international agreement.

L. The USC and Cooperating Agency may obtain the assistance of other public and private agencies in carrying out their respective obligations under this Project Agreement. The two parties may agree to accept contributions of property, services, facilities and funds for purposes of this Project Agreement from other public and private agencies, and may agree upon the participation of any such third party in carrying out activities under this Project Agreement.

M. The Embassy of the United States of America, under the direction of the Assistant Secretary for International Narcotics Matters of the U.S. Department of State, will carry out the functions of the United States Government under this agreement. The U.S. Government may assign these responsibilities to other agencies or officials without affecting the rights or obligations of any party to this agreement.

N. The present agreement shall enter into force when signed, either party may terminate this Project Agreement by giving the other 30 days written notice of intention to terminate it. Termination of this Project Agreement shall terminate any obligations of the two parties to make contributions pursuant to this Project Agreement, except of payments which they are committed to make pursuant to non-cancellable commitments entered into with third parties prior to the termination of the Project Agreement. It is expressly understood that the obligations under paragraph D relating to the use of property shall remain in force after such termination.

O. All commodities purchased by project funds, entering the country to support the agreement, shall be totally exonerated from port services charges as referred to in Article 18 Decree Law No. 18027, and in accordance with single article of Decree Law No. 19632 dated November 28, 1972.

There are two major police institutions in Peru, the Guardia Civil (GC) and the Peruvian Investigative Police (PIP). The 29,500 person GC, is an uniformed police organization charged with maintaining public order and crime prevention. The PIP, with its 10,000 person force, is responsible for investigating all serious offenses (felonies) including narcotics violations.

In recent years, the PIP has been active in narcotics interdiction and control. In 1975, PIP established a Directorate of Illicit Narcotics Trafficking (DINTID) in Lima with sub-units in each of the country's 25 Departments. Decree Law No.22095 enacted in 1978, assigned to the PIP, primary responsibility for the investigation of narcotics offenses.

Directorate of Illicit Narcotics Trafficking (DINTID)

DINTID, under the command of a PIP General Rank Officer, has a force of 220 based in Lima and 150 assigned to field units. In addition to the Headquarters and support elements, DINTID has eight operational divisions: Consumption, Public Transportation Terminals, Financial Investigation Division, Intelligence Operations, Raw Materials, Domestic Trafficking, and International Trafficking, and DINTID is presently operating from seven separate locations in Lima. During past years it has tried unsuccessfully to locate suitable facilities to centralize its operations. The present arrangement is unsatisfactory and has created serious administrative problems including under utilization of personnel and inefficient use of vehicles, communications equipment and other commodities. Increases in personnel will be only marginally effective until facilities can be centralized.

NARRATIVE

Consumption Division (DICON)

This Division is responsible for apprehending primarily small street traffickers who are selling directly to the consumer. It investigates complaints from parents, teachers, etc., regarding drug use/abuse and attempts to disrupt the street source. Its present strength is 40 officers and regular personnel.

Public Transportation Terminals (DICOT):

This Division is responsible for apprehending traffickers who are utilizing public transportation facilities for shipment of drugs, bus terminals, train stations, and airports.

Financial Investigations Division (DITFI):

The Unit, with a staff of 35 men, is responsible for investigating matters relating to currency transfers, laundering of trafficking money, bank transfers, etc.

Intelligence Division (DINTO):

This Division is responsible for obtaining intelligence information on major trafficking organizations and their networks.

NARRATIVE

Raw Materials Division (DCMP)

This Unit maintains records and investigates matters regarding controlled drugs, and chemicals and raw materials used in the production of drugs and narcotics. Its goal regarding cocaine, paste/base and cocaine HCL is to prevent needed chemicals from reaching illicit producers.

Domestic Traffic Division (DITNA)

DITNA is responsible for investigating cases regarding high-volume domestic traffickers concerning cocaine paste/base and increasingly cocaine HCL. The Unit works closely with the Consumption and International Traffic Divisions.

International Traffic Division (DITIN)

The Unit investigates narcotics cases which involve the shipment of cocaine paste/base and cocaine HCL to other countries. This Division provides coverage at Lima International Airport and the Port of Callao.

The Intelligence Section, formerly an operational unit, is now restricted to the collection of information and operational support for the operational divisions.

Communications Equipment

The FY 1980 Project Agreement completed a three year program to expand and upgrade DINTID communications' capabilities. The \$300,000 program provided UHF, HF and telex equipment. The 1981 Project Agreement provided a substantial amount of communications maintenance and test equipment as well as two training courses for PIP Communications personnel. In May 1982, DINTID established its own communications maintenance facilities which is staffed by two communications technicians and equipment which was previously controlled by central PIP

Communications. In early 1983, DINTID communications had to transfer its location when the landlord sold the building they occupied, another example of the inconvenience of DINTID not possessing its own centralized headquarters.

Vehicles Support

FY 1978-83 Project Agreements provided 86 vehicles to support DINTID operations. 49 of the vehicles are assigned to DINTID Lima and 37 to field units. DINTID also has received more than 70 vehicles from the GOP which were confiscated in narcotics cases.

Training

Narcotics training of its personnel receives very high priority within the PIP. The PIP training Institute is responsible for providing training and since 1978, has provided basic and advanced narcotics courses to more than 2,000 PIP personnel. In 1984, PIP Mobile Training teams provided courses to 308 men in three locations. In addition, 108 men received special training in financial investigations. Unused funds from earlier agreements will continue to support mobile training teams and fund travel to the US for advanced training.

Records and Information System

DINTID is presently utilizing a micro-processor provided by the FY 1979 Project Agreement. A local systems analysis firm completed in 1982 a study of DINTID's records and information requirements, and made specific recommendations on how DINTID should organize its information gathering to utilize most effectively its computer as an aid to drug investigations.

DINTID Field Units at Juanjui and Pucallpa

Juanjui, located at the northern end of the Upper Huallaga valley in the Department of San Martin, is a primary trafficking point for cocaine paste, and therefore it was decided to open a 30 man PIP/DINTID office there in 1983 under PROW/AG number 5. The unit commander and a dozen men opened the Juanjui unit in February 1983 and by May it had expanded to its full complement of 30. Under PROW/AG number 5, the USG provided \$150,000 of support toward the establishment and functioning of this unit, PROW/AG's number 6 and 7 provided administrative and operational support to Juanjui.

ProW Ag number 8 will continue commodity support for DINTID. Support funds remain in previous PRO/AGs for other cost expenditures in FY 85 and FY 86.
